Open for business

Hitchin Rugby Club opened its new £½ million changing room complex on Sunday.

Lady Valerie Dixon of the Valiant Trust officially opened Hitchin Rugby Club's new £½ million changing room complex on Sunday. NHDC Councillor Jane Gray (Executive Member for Leisure) was also present to lend her support to the club, together with representatives from the RFU and Hertfordshire RFU.

The opening marks a significant milestone for the club as it's the completion of the first stage of a £1.2 million four-phase project to completely redevelop the site. This first phase was built with the financial support from the club's own development fund, Sport England, the RFU and the Valiant Trust.

The new changing rooms will directly benefit all of the club's playing membership: children, youth, ladies and men. But the greatest beneficiaries will be the Mini & Youth section of the club – with nearly 580 children playing rugby, Hitchin is the largest sports group in North Hertfordshire and accommodating all of them every Sunday was proving to be a major block to the club's commitment to providing rugby to the youth of the local community.

With the added demand that this year's Rugby World Cup is likely to bring, the new changing rooms will significantly ease the pressure on providing changing facilities for all sections of the club.

The changing rooms, built by Linxcroft Construction Ltd, will not only provide excellent facilities for the club, but will become a fund-raiser for the club. Significant investment has been made in solar panelling and other 'green' innovations. The excess power from the panels will provide an additional source of income for the club and the capture and recycling of rain water from the large roof area will help provide the club's water needs for irrigating their pitches.

The club's President Tim Jeffries said, "We want to move onto our second phase building

as soon as we can. We now have a 99-year lease and we're determined to have facilities in the centre of Hitchin that reflect the increasing popularity of rugby and the rugby club's place in our community".

He also thanked three dedicated volunteers who have spearheaded the project – Peter Tasko, Chair of the Business Committee, Chris Jones, Club Treasurer and Iain Charnley, the club's project co-ordinator. The President added, "Great financial support and dedicated and hard-working volunteers is building this club into something that the whole town can be proud of".

PHASE 2

Much to the surprise of a few naysayers, but for all to see, we have successfully raised (and spent) £475,000 or completing Phase 1 of our ambitious clubhouse and changing room redevelopment programme.

The six changing rooms constructed at the far end of the pavilion are now in use and provide us with an excellent facility and a great springboard for the next step of our plans. Iain Charnley, Chris Jones and I have taken a short breather to recover from the project but now wish to move on to Phase 2.

Phase 2 will involve the construction of a further four changing rooms, ancillary rooms to support the functions of the club both on and off the pitch and a new function room to replace the pavilion hall. The function room will provide a multiuse space to cater for private lets, training courses and larger club dinners; it will be both a source of income and

a vast improvement to club space and facilities.

To start construction, our Club needs your support. We are to at least match the funding of Phase 1 and will succeed in this by a combination of grant applications (when they become available), considerable fundraising on our own behalf and by attracting sponsorship and donations, be they corporate or individual. Our goal is for each of us to help either through sponsorship or by undertaking fundraising activities to start rebuilding the development fund.

Miranda and I started the fundraising ball rolling this autumn by raising £6,000 towards the development fund (see below) and we believe that many of you will be prepared develop other fundraising programmes and opportunities to rapidly grow the fund. We appreciate that this is an ambitious

goal, but we have done this once and know we can do it again.

If you have any concepts or ideas relating to fundraising, wish to help or can bring a sponsors or donor to the table, either contact Mark Adamson, Chris Jones, Richard Lucas or me or ask any head coach or committee member to bring your proposals or suggestion to the Business Committee.

This is an exciting time for the club and we wish to maintain our momentum so that we can embark on the next phase of club redevelopment as rapidly as possible.

The things we say in a bar, or at an oyster festival after a cider or two can come back to haunt us. In October 2014, sitting at the fabulous oyster festival in Falmouth, I suggested to Miranda that we could take an extended autumn holiday the following year walk from Hitchin to the Oyster Festival in Falmouth.

Twelve months later, after many practice walks, lots of blisters and sore feet we duly arrived back in Falmouth. We were greeted by the Mayor, members of the Falmouth Marine Band and the infamous Betty Stogs (look it up). We processed along the high street to the Kings Pipe where we ended our adventure with a dozen oysters and a glass of cider.

The Autumn Stroll had taken us 19½ days, two of which we rested. We had climbed 33,223 feet and descended 33,444 (I assume it's closer to the water than Hitchin), we had walked for a total of 114 hours and 55 minutes at an average speed of 2.9mph and covered 337 miles. But more importantly we had raised £6,766 for the Lymphoma association and £6,097 towards Phase 2 of our clubhouse redevelopment.

During the walk we encountered many wonderful and interesting people; saw beautiful countryside and wildlife (you've got to love those bullocks) and came

It was a real adventure and we saw and did far more than can be covered here. It was a great trip and we are delighted to have helped to raise funds for two such good causes.

Gerald Cherry & Bill Boyd

Within the space of a few weeks the Club has lost two of its stalwart members. Gerald Cherry always a forward, and Bill Boyd almost always a back.

Gerald was a founder member and Bill thereabouts (see the Club history).

Both had played their initial years for the Club and to some extent moved on. Both returned on active service in the mid 60s in the Club's hour of need. It was in some difficulty. Whilst serving this common purpose Gerald and Bill had little else in common other than they both went to the Boys School.

GERALD CHERRY

Gerald's working life was spent with his brother and father in their hardware and lorry business in Nightingale Road. A hands on man – he never owned pen or paper – he was well known for his grasp of basic Anglo Saxon language and had very strong standards in life.

Never first to the bar Gerald was totally to the fore when in support of the Club's social activity or when a lorry or physical activity was called for. Being principally a player, although Chairman 1980 - 83, Gerald in later years had special recall of all the members that he played or had a pint with. The Club was very special to him.

BILL BOYD

Almost a complete contrast was Bill. Always a Scot, dare we forget it, he was known at the Boys School as a highly talented sportsman. He excelled at everything, particularly if he had his mind on it.

There is no doubt that Bill could be distracted by other activity. He once, on School Sports Day, told a master he would not take another long jump, with the School Record well within his grasp, because he was in the High Jump later.

Bill was a long time in Barclays employment, as were a number of members at the time. His move to Welwyn Garden City meant we saw less of him but his golf improved.

All of us who enjoyed playing and having a pint with Bill and Gerald will carry these memories with us to the final whistle.

Back 2 Schoolival, a Hitchin RFC based event run by 2nd team skipper Adam Howard, was recognised for their June 6th 2015 event by the RFU on 5th September before the World Cup warm up game between England and Ireland.

Back 2 Schoolival offered the chance for ex-pupils of the local schools to reunite to form a rugby team to take part in a charity festival.

Schools taking part included Hitchin Boys School, the Priory, Knights Templar and John Henry Newman to name a few and 180 players took part on the day. The day raised £1,200 for charity, including £1,000 for Hitchin based charity the North Herts Sanctuary who provide temporary housing to those in need.

In recognition of this, Back 2 Schoolival was awarded the RFU Young Rugby Ambassador Best Event of the Year 2015.

Event organiser Adam Howard travelled to Twickenham to receive the award, with England Women World Cup Winners Sarah Hunter and La Toya Mason present to meet the winners.

Recognition from the RFU for the event means a lot to those behind Back 2 Schoolival and has spurred them on to increase their efforts for 2016. Back 2 Schoolival will return to King George playing fields in Hitchin on Saturday 9th July, when the Old Boys tournament will return
